




1. This migrating bird, also known as a "Fish Hawk," is an apex predator and is the only bird of prey that fishes for all of its food!



2. This sand-colored shorebird comes to the coasts of the Peconic Estuary in the spring and summer to nest in the dunes. It relies on horseshoe crab eggs for much of its nutrition.



3. This bird has green eyes and often swims with only its head and neck above water, ready to dive for fish. It lacks waterproof feathers so the bird must use the air to dry them!



4. This large non-swimming wading bird with feathers the color of water or sky, has long legs and can be found standing in the estuary very quietly in the effort to snatch surprised fish!



5. This long-necked bird with black legs and a bright yellow bill can sometimes be confused with a bird that has the word 'Snowy' in its name. However, the 'Snowy' bird has a black bill which can help the spotter tell the difference between the two species.
